

A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR CHRIS



CARING ADULT + TEENAGER = GOOD STUFF!

On a recent weekend 5 of us from Central Church descended on Chicago for a national youth ministry conference. Our goal was to learn all we could from Christian writers & speakers, to build on what we already do well, toward a growing & sustainable youth ministry.

We learned some sobering national statistics about youth who are near the end of their high school years, such as:

- 6 out of 7 seniors claimed they did not feel equipped with a faith that prepared them for college;
- 50% of students reported they drifted away from awareness of God in their lives following high school graduation.

How can we create success for our youth having faith? At Central Church youth participate in a variety of activities, are known by caring adults, and have good resources for learning, but we could do so much more! One concept that resonated with us at the conference was “Sticky Faith”, which simply means to help develop a faith that “sticks with” youth, during the high school years and beyond. We believe there are 5 learnings here our entire church could benefit from.

- 1- Sticky Leaders. Youth benefit most by spending time with adults who work at their own relationship with God. Leaders who pour themselves into youth have the most to offer when they work daily at cultivating their own authentic faith practice.
- 2- Sticky churches have a 5:1 ratio. Rather than the typical goal in youth groups of 5 youth to 1 adult, have 5 adults in the congregation commit to know each youth. This could be as simple as greeting a young person by name, attending their school events, taking them out for a latte monthly to learn about their dreams/struggles, or writing a note to let a young person know you see great promise in them. We ask, who are the youth you invest in on a regular basis?
- 3- Sticky families. Parents, aunts, uncles, etc who share openly their own faith story & pray at meals & verbalize how they see God active in their lives – create a higher “spiritual literacy” for the young people in their family.
- 4- Sticky gospel. When students see the rest of us modeling our faith, we need to define the gospel so that doubts & struggle can be appreciated. In a survey, 70% of youth struggle with doubts about faith but do not know where to talk about it. Accept but engage young people in their searching questions.
- 5- Sticky justice. Acts of mission and mercy out into the world need to be framed in terms of “why are we doing this?”. The connection needs to be reinforced over and over that followers of Jesus are to labor & spend resources on behalf of others, especially the poor.

Champions of Youth is an ongoing group which meets at Central to search out how we might do a better job creating a faith-forming environment for the youth among us. Anyone who cares about youth is most welcome to join us; next discussion is April 7th, 5:30 in the Lounge.

Let us notice our youth and count it a privilege that we can positively influence their awareness of God’s love in their lives. Surely, it is all our work to pray and discuss and seek wisdom over what experiences we want our youth to be exposed to between the ages of 12 to 18. Here is one item you could pray for – a team of adult leaders currently being recruited to oversee our new format confirmation class (for 8th graders) set to begin in the Fall.

Remember, Caring Adult + Teenager = Good Stuff!

TURNING POINT GROUPS

Small groups. Hmmmm...why are small groups important? When my children were younger I encouraged them to be in a small group at school or church. By participating in athletics, music, forensics and/or church activities my kids would hopefully feel like they belonged because they'd have a core group of peers they would know. For me a

feeling of belonging is crucial.

Then I think about what's important for me...if belonging was good for my kids the same should be true for me. John and I joined church in the late 1960s. The atmosphere was warm but we only knew a few people. After becoming members we joined "Couples Club" which met monthly for fun or recreational activities. In today's world this group would not be Couple's Club but would be all-inclusive! By attending the activities we met people and felt that yes, indeed, we did belong!

In the 1970s popular small gatherings were the 5 - 8 Yokefellow groups that met twice a month. After an informational meeting John and I joined Yokefellow 5 that met in each other's homes for conversation, food and discussion of whichever book or pamphlet we were currently reading and studying. Sometimes our families were part of our get-togethers especially if we went on "over-nights" or had an activity such as sledding.

Eventually our families changed, children grew up and began their own adult lives. Without realizing what was happening Yokefellow 5 became a once a month meeting group as our lives became complicated by traveling to visit children and grandchildren. We still meet once a month, occasionally have a topic to discuss but more often share our experiences since we last met. We haven't dropped our Yokefellow title probably because that's how we identify ourselves...that's who we are within the bigger church.

Over the years we have become tied to each other through our experiences, our families and love and respect for each other. We have traveled downstate, to North Carolina, Wisconsin, to the bluffs of Lake Michigan, to Idaho and Wyoming for children's weddings. Our support doesn't end there...we've been with each other for services when parents have died and rejoice with each new grandchild. And, when Kyle died in 2008 it was Yokefellow 5 that came and prepared a meal for us. They have been on hand to help and understand during these few difficult years. For instance, when I said I just couldn't plan a meal for our Yokefellow meeting and asked everyone to instead bring a favorite pizza no one grumbled.

Some of us from Yokefellow 5 have been in this small group for 35 years. Although we no longer meet twice a month for study we are a group of people who have become caring and supportive friends who occasionally study, always share and know we can count on each other. Yes indeed! Small groups are important!
